The Bureau will celebrate 100 years of printing United States postage stamps from July 1, 1994, until June 30, 1995. On July 1, 1894, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing began the production of postage stamps for the United States Post Office Department. Prior to that time, stamps were printed by private banknote companies.

In April 1894, the Post Office Department turned over the dies, rolls and plates of the then-current stamps. In order to distinguish the Bureau's work, triangles were added to the corners of the existing dies. The 30-cent and one-dollar denomination stamps were substituted for the 30-cent and 90-cent denominations and two-dollar and five-dollar stamps were issued. The first of the work printed by the Bureau was placed on sale on July 18, 1894. By the end of the first year of operation, the Bureau had printed and delivered more than 21 million sheets of stamps for the Post Office Department, embracing 13 denominations of ordinary postage stamps. Those stamps are featured on this souvenir card:

On July 1, 1894, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing started creating postage stamps for the United States Post Office Department. Prior to that time, stamps were printed by private banknote companies. On July 1, 1994, the Bureau celebrated its centennial of creating United States Postage Stamps.

In April 1894, the Post Office Department turned over the dies, rolls and plates of the then-current stamps. In order to distinguish the Bureau's work, triangles were added to the corners of the existing dies. Of the dies received from the Post Office Department, the 50-cent and the one-dollar denomination stamps were substituted for the 30-cent and 90-cent denomination stamps. In addition, two-dollar and five-dollar stamps were issued. The first of the work printed by the Bureau was placed on sale on July 18, 1894. By the end of the first year, the Bureau had printed and delivered more than 21 million sheets of stamps for the Post Office Department, embracing 13 denominations of ordinary postage stamps. The 13 stamps are featured on the centennial souvenir card.
